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One of the most loving and caring thing you can do for your doxie is have him tested once a year for microfilaria. The best time to test is in the spring so you can catch any late in season parasites that would not have developed enough for testing during the winter months.

- * Turn over kiddy pools after each swim.
- * Dispose old tires appropriately.
- * Do not leave buckets, barrels, or other water containers outside.
- * Drain puddles or other areas that contain stagnant water.
- * Stock ponds with mosquito eating fish.

Transmission occurs when a mosquito bites an infected dog and ingests heartworm larvae. When that mosquito bites another dog it injects some of the larvae under his skin resulting in the dog contracting Canine Heartworm Disease (CHWD).

The health of the dog with CHWD becomes more complicated when a female filaria produces offspring (microfilaria), causing pulmonary arteries leading to the heart and lungs to become obstructed. The resulting reduced blood flow leads to heart failure and the dog will die.

But, there is good news for all dogs ~ CHWD is 100% preventable! There are a variety of oral prescription products that you can purchase from your veterinarian. The medication is simple ~ one pill each month.

CHWD is treatable, but it is so much wiser to prevent it. than to treat it!
