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WHO was established seventy two years ago by the United Nations as a specialized agency responsible for international public health. In early March 2020 WHO declared that the COVID-19 novel coronavirus is a global pandemic. In the panic over the spread of the virus, people are worried not only about their own health but the health of their furry family members too. WHO states, "There is no evidence that a dog, cat or any pet can transmit COVID-19" to humans, however, there is mounting evidence that people can spread the virus to animals.

Although, COVID-19 is not believed to be a health threat to dogs, they can still test positive for the virus. The first known pet case of COVID-19 in the United States appeared in an adorable little Pug named, Winston, living in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. Two out of three family members in Winston's home are front-line health care workers who tested positive for the virus. Duke University did a study on the family and their pets, with only Winston testing positive out of two dogs, a cat, and a lizard. Winston only experienced mild symptoms. In Hong Kong two dogs tested positive for COVID-19, both dogs lived in homes with COVID-19 positive pet parents. Local health officials characterize the cases of the two dogs in Hong Kong as "likely to be a case of human-to-animal transmision," neither dog showed any symptons of the virus. Hong Kong continues to test dogs and cats living in the home with human positive CORONA-19. Officially they have tested seventeen dogs and eight cats from households with confirmed COVID-19 pet parents. The results of the testing indicated only two dogs tested positive for COVID-19 out of the twenty-five pets tested.

Guidelines for Pet Care

- If you are sick avoid contact with your dog. No petting, snuggling, kissing and no bed sharing.

- Walk your dog on a leash, maintaining at least six feet from other people and animals.
- Avoid dog parks or public places where a large number of people and dogs gather.
